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1. Introduction and purpose of the study

- 1.1 The purpose of the Settlement Sustainability Study is to provide a comparative assessment of the sustainability of the settlements within Lichfield district. This will provide an assessment of the relative level of services and facilities within each settlement. This evidence will help to inform a revised settlement hierarchy which, along with a range of evidence, will inform our local plan. The study is comprised of two parts, these being:
- A settlement hierarchy which considers the sustainability of different settlements across the district and groups them into categories.
 - An analysis of the capacity of critical infrastructure types.

Part 1: Settlement hierarchy

- 1.2 The settlement hierarchy is a way of categorising the settlements in Lichfield district and grouping those settlements together that have similar characteristics in terms of the services and facilities their residents have access to. This assessment will use a desk-based approach to detail and assess the sustainability of settlements within the district, primarily using:
- Data on available services and facilities present within settlements for example: post office, health facilities (including doctors' surgeries, pharmacists and dentists), schools, community halls, pubs and shops.
 - Data on the availability of sustainable methods of transport, including public transport and the accessibility to services and facilities using sustainable transport.
 - Data on the accessibility to employment opportunities, leisure, open spaces and retail facilities.
- 1.3 Following the assessment, at the top of the hierarchy are the settlements which have the greatest level of infrastructure in terms of the range of facilities and services accessible to their communities. Smaller settlements with the least facilities, services and accessibility to public transport are at the bottom of the hierarchy.
- 1.4 In addition to providing evidence which will assist in the development of the Local Plan and the settlement hierarchy, this study will also provide evidence which can be used by communities preparing neighbourhood plans.
- 1.5 The Council has previously prepared several [settlement sustainability studies](#), the latest in 2020. This Settlement Sustainability Study builds upon and updates that earlier evidence and considers the full range of settlements across the district.

Part 2: Settlement infrastructure capacity

- 1.6 Part 2 of the study will consider the existing capacity of the following critical infrastructure services, which are considered to have the greatest potential to limit growth in the district. These are:
- Primary and secondary education provision.
 - Healthcare provision.
 - Public transport and highways.

- 1.7 This will inform] the council’s selection of a preferred growth option by providing an understanding of infrastructure services in our key settlements and identifying existing capacity surpluses and deficits. Specifically, this study will:
- Assess existing services and facilities and any significant infrastructure capacity or constraints that are evident.
 - Identify planned enhancement of the capacity of existing or new infrastructure.
 - Consider the impact of external drivers and potential growth options.
- 1.8 At this early stage of the plan making process, it will not be possible to be specific about the quantum or future locations for development. As a result, many of the findings of this study will be based solely upon the review of existing strategies and publicly available information provided to the council by infrastructure delivery partners. As the plan progresses, further stakeholder engagement will take place and this study will be updated to reflect those findings.

2. Policy context

National policy context

- 2.1 The [National Planning Policy Framework](#) (NPPF) was revised in December 2023¹ and sets out national planning policies for England. A number of the NPPF's key principles are relevant when considering the sustainability of settlements in the district. The NPPF places great importance on the delivery of sustainable development and the promotion of healthy and safe communities.
- 2.2 In particular, the NPPF emphasises the importance of minimising the length and number of journeys to work, shopping and leisure activities and increasing the opportunities for sustainable forms of transport to be used to make such trips. Further to this, the NPPF is clear that authorities should avoid isolated development in rural areas where access to facilities is more limited. The key parts of the NPPF which relate to this study are:
- Paragraph 8: Achieving sustainable development means that the planning system has three overarching objectives, which are interdependent and need to be pursued in mutually supportive ways, one of these is a social objective – to support strong, vibrant and healthy communities, by ensuring that a sufficient number and range of homes can be provided to meet the needs of present and future generations; and by fostering a well-designed and safe built environment, with accessible services and open spaces that reflect current and future needs and support communities' health social and cultural well-being.
 - Paragraph 9 of the NPPF notes that planning policies and decisions should play an active role in guiding development towards sustainable locations, taking local circumstances into account, to reflect the character, needs and opportunities of each area. Furthermore, to promote sustainable development in rural areas, housing should be located where it will enhance or maintain the vitality of rural communities.
 - Paragraph 83 of the NPPF requires that new housing should be located where it will enhance or maintain the vitality of rural communities in order to promote sustainable development in rural areas. It also advises that planning policies should identify opportunities for villages to grow and thrive, especially where this will support local services and acknowledges that where there are groups of smaller settlements, development in one village may support services in a village nearby. Paragraph 90 also requires local authorities to define a network and hierarchy of town centres in their area.
 - Paragraph 96: Planning policies and decisions should aim to achieve healthy, inclusive and safe places and beautiful buildings which enable and support healthy lifestyle, especially where this would address identified local health and wellbeing needs.
 - Paragraph 97: To provide the social, recreational and cultural facilities and services the community needs, planning policies and decisions should plan positively for the provision and use of shared spaces, community facilities and ensure an integrated

approach to considering the location of housing, economic uses and community facilities and services.

- Paragraph 99: It is important that a sufficient choice of school places is available to meet the needs of existing and new communities.
- Paragraph 109: Significant development should be focused on locations which are or can be made sustainable, through limiting the need to travel and offering a genuine choice of transport modes.
- Paragraph 110: Planning policies should support an appropriate mix of uses across an area and within larger scale sites, to minimise the number and length of journeys needed for employment, shopping, leisure, education and other activities.

Local policy context

- 2.3 The Local Plan in Lichfield district consists of two parts: the [Local Plan Strategy](#) and [Local Plan Allocations](#) documents. The Local Plan Strategy was adopted in February 2015 and sets out the spatial strategy for the district through ‘*Core Policy 1: The Spatial Strategy*’ and ‘*Core Policy 6: Housing Delivery*’. This focuses growth on the sustainable settlements of Lichfield and Burntwood with further growth at several ‘key’ rural settlements (Alrewas, Armitage with Handsacre, Fazeley, Fradley, Shenstone and Whittington).
- 2.4 The Local Plan Allocations document forms the second part of the adopted local plan and was adopted in July 2019. The Local Plan Allocations allocates a range of sites across the settlements to deliver the growth requirements of the Local Plan Strategy. The council has made significant progress in delivering this scale of growth through allocated sites included within both parts of the adopted plan.
- 2.5 The current local plan included a commitment to review the local plan. Work on the review of the current local plan, known as the Local Plan Review or Local Plan 2040 commenced in 2018 and the Local Plan 2040 was submitted for examination in June 2022. In October 2023 a decision was taken by Full Council to withdraw the submitted plan from its examination and to commence work on a new local plan for the district.
- 2.6 The [Local Development Scheme](#) outlines the timetable for the new local plan. This study will form part of the evidence base being developed by the council to support the new local plan. It will also be of use to those communities preparing and updating neighbourhood plans.

3. Methodology

Assessment of settlement sustainability

3.1 The following section sets out the methodology which has been used to assess the sustainability of settlements within the district. The study has used a desk-based approach, alongside site visits and local knowledge of the settlements, to understand which facilities and services are present within the settlement.

3.2 For the purposes of the study, all settlements which have settlement boundaries identified through the adopted local plan have been assessed. There are numerous small settlements and hamlets within the district many located within the wider rural areas of the district some of which are 'washed over' by Green Belt. For the purposes of this study, these settlements are not assessed. The following settlements have been assessed:

- Lichfield City.
- Burntwood.
- Alrewas.

- 3.3 To measure the comparative sustainability of settlements, several key services and facilities have been identified which will be used as criteria to be recorded on a settlement-by-settlement basis.
- 3.4 The services and facilities which make the criteria within this study have been selected as they are considered key for a sustainable settlement. These facilities have been chosen to reflect the criteria in the NPPF for sustainable and community facilities as can be seen in Table 1 (below).
- 3.5 In addition to the NPPF, the services and facilities have also partly been identified in part by understanding which services and facilities communities make the most use of. The [Department for Transport National Travel Survey 2022](#) set out data which demonstrates the main reasons people make trips ([Appendix A](#)). The data demonstrates that shopping, commuting and education are responsible for the highest number of trips on average nationally.
- 3.6 Analysis of this data would suggest that where communities have better access to these services and facilities locally or by sustainable modes of transport then this will assist in reducing the number of trips made.

Access to services and facilities

- 3.7 The key services and facilities have been identified and recorded for each settlement using a desktop analysis. Once these were identified, the relevant parish councils were contacted to provide a local check of the services and facilities identified. In determining these indicators, the study has had regard to key national policy requirements regarding sustainable development, sustainable transport and promoting healthy and safe communities as set out in Table 1. Context has also been considered in regard to local circumstances of the district and its relationship with other neighbouring settlements.
- 3.8 The key indicators can be grouped into themes as set out below and will be used to indicate the sustainability of a settlement within Lichfield district:
- Education.
 - Health.
 - Culture and community.
 - Leisure and open spaces.
 - Employment.
 - Transport.
 - Retail and services.
- 3.9 These indicators will give a consistent high-level indication of the services and facilities accessible to existing settlements; as well as the capacity of these services and facilities to support further growth. Each of these key services areas are considered in greater detail in the following sections. This will provide justification and an explanation as to how each settlement has been assessed against the specific criteria.

Education facilities

- 3.10 Education was the third biggest generator of trips in 2022 according to Department for Transport data (**Appendix A**). Therefore, the location of schools is important when considering development to reduce avoidable trips by private transport. Paragraph 99 of the NPPF highlights the importance of meeting the needs of existing new communities by ensuring a sufficient choice of school places.

Primary schools

- 3.11 Local primary education provision is important for a child's development and reduces the need for children to travel large distances. State funded primary schools will generally cater for a local demand and provide an accessible and important day-to-day facility. Private schools also play a significant role in providing local educational opportunities and can help meet the demand for primary education within a community. Schools can extend their regular service such as before and after school clubs, and preschool nurseries; in addition, the facilities can be used for other community uses or act as a local community hub.
- 3.12 For this indicator, points are awarded based on the number of primary schools within the settlement, using the government's [Get information about schools](#) service and [Staffordshire County Council's School Search tool](#).

Secondary schools

- 3.13 For this indicator, points are awarded based on the number of secondary schools within the settlement, using the government's [Get information about schools](#) service and [Staffordshire County Council's School Search tool](#). Additionally, public transport access to a secondary school is considered if there is no secondary school within the settlement. Therefore, if a settlement lacks a secondary school but has a dedicated school bus service or rail connection to a secondary school outside the settlement, it will score 3 points.

Nurseries and pre-schools

- 3.14 In addition to schooling, local childcare is a particular requirement for those with young children. A choice of childcare within a settlement can draw people with young children, or those wishing to have children to an area. The availability of places in pre-schools and nurseries provides an indication of the opportunities available for potential new residents and the sustainability of a settlement to provide services to its existing residents or those working within it. Provision of sufficient pre-school and nursery facilities allows families to return to work (where possible or wanted), thus helping to stimulate the economy and improve the prosperity of residents.
- 3.15 The number of pre-school and nurseries in a settlement has been measured using a combination of Google search, the government's [Get information about schools](#) service and the [daynurseries.co.uk search facility](#). This includes private nurseries providing year-round care as well as term time only pre-schools and pre-schools attached to primary schools.

Health

- 3.16 This section considers healthcare provision across Lichfield district. Whilst these forms of infrastructure will be used infrequently by most of the district's residents, they can be of vital importance for the health and wellbeing of residents, when they are required. They are clearly therefore of critical importance to the district.
- 3.17 It is considered that below indicators meet the NPPF's principles of sustainable development through the social objective of providing accessible services (paragraph 8) not only in distance but through the number of GP surgeries which can be used to represent a wider provision of healthcare services. These indicators also meet NPPF guidance to create and maintain healthy communities by reducing inequalities and providing greater access to first contact health services and reducing the impact on emergency services and hospital care through early intervention.

GP surgeries

- 3.18 GP surgeries provide an essential healthcare service which should be accessible within a small catchment and meet a local demand. This category includes both permanent surgeries and part-time surgeries.
- 3.19 Access to GP surgeries will be measured by counting the number of GP surgeries in a settlement, using the [NHS find a GP tool](#). A settlement with 4 or more surgeries indicates that the settlement has a wide range of healthcare services and settlements; with 1 GP surgery representing adequate healthcare provision. Settlements with no GP surgery were assessed by the travel time by car to a GP surgery (which could be located outside the district) during peak hours of 8-9am.

Pharmacies

- 3.20 The provision of a pharmacy plays an integral role in maintaining the health of the community and can provide valuable health care advice and services which can free up GP capacity. Pharmacies provide an important service to those who do not have regular access to private transport or in locations with limited public transport.
- 3.21 Access to pharmacies has been measured by counting the number of pharmacies in the settlement using the [NHS find a pharmacy tool](#). A settlement with 4 or more pharmacies indicates a wide range and greater access to healthcare services; whilst a settlement with 1 pharmacy represents adequate provision. Settlements with no pharmacy are assessed by the travel time to a pharmacy (within or outside the district) within peak hours of 8-9am.

Hospitals

- 3.22 Access to hospitals has been measured using the [NHS find a hospital tool](#). A settlement will score highly against this indicator if it has a hospital with an accident and emergency (A&E) department within its boundary, however there are currently no hospitals within Lichfield District that provide an A&E department. Points will therefore be awarded to settlements located near hospitals with A&E departments and/or if there is a community hospital (non-A&E) within the settlement.

Dentists

- 3.23 As with the provision of a pharmacy, a dentist is a service beneficial to the overall healthcare provision that a settlement can offer. However, a demand for a dentist is usually less frequent than that for a GP.
- 3.24 Access to a dentist has been measured by counting the number of dental practices using the [NHS find a dentist tool](#). For the purposes of this study, only dentists offering NHS appointments have been included.

Opticians

- 3.25 Opticians are considered an important healthcare service, particularly for the elderly. Access to opticians has been measured by counting the number of opticians within a settlement using the [NHS Find an NHS sight test tool](#).

Culture and community

- 3.26 Paragraph 97 of the NPPF highlights that social and cultural well-being should be taken into account to help achieve the principles of sustainable development and that prosperous and rural economies should enable the "retention and development of "accessible local services and community facilities, such as local shops, meeting places, sports venues, open space, cultural buildings, public houses and places of worship."
- 3.27 This section will look at the most appropriate measures to assess the sustainability of a settlement from a cultural and community perspective. The availability of community buildings, including community centres, village halls and faith facilities, can have a direct influence over the quality of life of residents. Community buildings can help to promote healthy and socially inclusive communities.

Community buildings

- 3.28 These spaces provide a key facility that enables a range of social, recreational and cultural activities. These are essential to help manifest strong community bonds and promote good mental health. This indicator has been measured by totalling the number of churches, village halls, scout huts, cadet huts, community day centres and pavilions within a settlement².

Cultural buildings

- 3.29 The number of cultural buildings in a settlement is an important indicator of the community's access to cultural and recreational activities. These buildings, which include theatres, museums, concert halls, cinemas and visitor centres, serve as hubs for artistic expression, historical education, entertainment and tourism³.

Libraries

- 3.30 The presence of a library within a settlement is an important resource for residents, offering access to books, digital media, internet services and a variety of educational and cultural

programmes. Libraries serve as community hubs by fostering learning, social interaction and community cohesion.

- 3.31 The opening times of a library are critical in determining how accessible it is to the community. Extensive and flexible opening hours ensure that people with different schedules, including students, working professionals and families can access library services. Libraries with generous opening times can also offer more events and activities for the community⁴.
- 3.32 In areas where there is no permanent library, mobile libraries⁵ play a vital role in ensuring that residents still have access to library services. They provide an invaluable service to individuals who might otherwise be unable to visit a library, such as the elderly, those with mobility issues, or residents without reliable transport.

Pubs and bars

- 3.33 Public houses can provide a community focus and can also diversify their function to a number of other services such as a community room, small shop or youth centre. They play a significant role in the social fabric of a community, providing venues for socialising, hosting events and supporting local traditions⁶.

Leisure and open spaces

3.34 A key aspect of the NPPF's principles of sustainable development is to support the provision of social and environmental benefits to the community. Paragraph 8 of the NPPF states local authorities should foster "well-designed, beautiful and safe places, with accessible services and open spaces that reflect current and future needs and support communities' health, social and cultural well-being". From an environmental perspective the NPPF also highlights the importance of contributing towards protecting and enhancing "our natural, built and historic environment, including making effective use of land, improving biodiversity, using natural resources prudently".

Indoor and outdoor sports

3.35 Access to indoor and outdoor sports facilities is considered a key factor in the assessment of sustainable development and communities. Easy access to these facilities without the need to travel helps to foster a more active and healthy society. As such, the types of indoor and outdoor sports available in a settlement has been assessed, using data provided by [Sports England's Active Places Power database](#) and the [Lichfield District Playing Pitch Strategy](#).

Open spaces

3.36 Paragraph 97 of the NPPF seeks to promote healthy and safe communities, setting out that 'to provide the social, recreational and cultural facilities and services the community needs, planning policies and decisions should plan positively for the provision and use of shared spaces, community facilities and other local services to enhance the sustainability of communities and residential environments.'

3.37 The variety of open and green spaces within a settlement is a critical indicator of the community's quality of life, environmental health and recreational opportunities. These spaces, categorised using the following typologies from the [Open Spaces Assessment](#):

- Natural and semi-natural greenspaces: These areas, such as woodlands, meadows and wetlands, provide habitats for wildlife, support biodiversity and offer residents opportunities for nature-based recreation and relaxation.
- Amenity greenspace: These are well-maintained areas such as parks, gardens and landscaped spaces, which enhance the aesthetic appeal of a settlement and provide venues for casual recreation and social interaction.
- Green corridors: Pathways, trails and linear parks that connect different parts of the settlement facilitate walking, cycling and wildlife movement, promoting sustainable transportation and environmental connectivity.
- Provision for children and young people: Playgrounds, equipped play areas and skate parks provide safe and engaging environments for physical activity and social interaction for younger residents.

- Civic spaces: plazas, town squares and public gathering areas serve as focal points for community events, socialising and cultural activities, enhancing civic pride and community engagement.
- Allotments: Allotment plots offer residents the opportunity to grow their own food, promoting sustainable living, healthy eating and a sense of community.
- Cemeteries and churchyards: These spaces offer quiet, reflective areas that honour the community's heritage and provide green spaces that contribute to the overall tranquillity and greenery of the settlement.
- Water-based recreation: Lakes, rivers and ponds support activities such as boating, fishing and wildlife observation, offering residents diverse recreational opportunities and enhancing the scenic value of the area.

Employment

- 3.38 The travel data prepared by the Department for Transport identifies that commuting journeys account for the second largest number of trips per person (**Appendix A**). As such providing residents with access to employment opportunities within or near their communities enhances the sustainability of the settlement.

- 3.39 Lichfield district has a high rate of out commuting when compared to other districts in the county, this is no surprise given the district's location on the edge of the West Midlands conurbation. Paragraph 110 of the NPPF states that planning policies should support an appropriate mix of uses across an area and within larger scale sites to minimise the number and length of journeys needed for employment for amongst other reasons. Therefore, where a settlement would have access by sustainable means of transport to other centres which offer employment opportunities this will be recorded through this study.

Time taken to nearest employment area

- 3.40 A settlement will be considered to have good access to employment locations if there is an allocated existing employment site within or adjacent to the settlement; this is the case for Lichfield, Burntwood, Fradley, Fazeley, Shenstone and Armitage.
- 3.41 For this indicator, the travel time is measured from the centre of the settlement to the nearest allocated employment site at peak commuting hours (between 8am and 9am). Shorter travel times receive higher points, reflecting better accessibility and connectivity. If a settlement contains an allocated employment site it is awarded maximum points.

Distance travelled to work

- 3.42 Paragraph 109 of the NPPF promotes the accessibility of locations and limiting the need to travel. As such, this study has also looked at the travel to work distances of residents within each settlement. This metric, measured as the percentage of employed individuals aged 16 years or over, provides insight into commuting patterns and the proximity of employment opportunities. It is important to note that the data was collected from the [2021 Census](#), which is presented at the parish level. In many cases, the settlement boundary does not align precisely with the parish boundary.
- 3.43 It is also important to note that the data was collected during the COVID-19 pandemic, a period that saw significant changes in work patterns, including increased remote working. Therefore, there is potential that this data may not fully reflect current or post-pandemic commuting trends.
- 3.44 For this indicator, points were awarded based on the predominant commuting distance category that most residents fall within.

Transport

- 3.45 Residents within the district use the higher order services and facilities which are in larger settlements outside of the district. High order services include services such as an airport, leisure centre or large furniture store. For example, residents of Fazeley will use the services and facilities of neighbouring Tamworth. Therefore, accessing these higher order services by public transport is important to ensure that residents can access key services and facilities in a sustainable manner.
- 3.46 Paragraph 109 of the NPPF highlights the importance of focusing development at locations which can be made sustainable, through limiting the need to travel and offering a genuine choice of transport modes.

Bus services

- 3.47 The number of weekday bus services in a settlement is a critical indicator of public transportation accessibility and convenience for residents. This measure highlights the availability and frequency of bus services that residents can rely on for their daily commutes, errands and other activities.
- 3.48 Availability of weekend bus services enables residents to engage in leisure and recreational activities, visit friends and family and participate in community events. This enhances the overall quality of life and well-being.
- 3.49 For both indicators, points are awarded based on the number of bus services available. Higher points reflect better bus service coverage, indicating a well-connected and accessible settlement⁷.

Railway stations

- 3.50 A railway station within the settlement provides direct access to regional and national rail networks, significantly enhancing connectivity for residents. This facilitates easy commuting to nearby cities and towns for work, education and leisure.
- 3.51 For this indicator, points are awarded based on the presence and proximity of a railway station. Maximum points are given to settlements with a railway station within the settlement, 5 points for stations within 3 miles and zero points for no nearby station⁸.

Access to primary road network

3.52 Quick access to the primary road network ensures that residents can efficiently travel to nearby towns, cities and key destinations. This enhances the overall connectivity of the settlement⁹.

Retail and Services

3.53 Paragraph 88d of the NPPF states that planning policies and decisions enable "the retention and development of accessible local services and community facilities, such as local shops, meeting places, sports venues, open space, cultural buildings, public houses and places of worship". This section looks specifically at the retail offer and services that settlements can provide for their residents considering the current health of the high street, wider retail offer and key requirements that combine to create a sustainable settlement.

Financial services

- 3.54 The presence of banks and financial services¹⁰ on the high street helps to reduce the inequality gap for those on low incomes, those with disabilities and the elderly by providing easy access and advice to finance and financial advice.
- 3.55 Post offices offer a wide range of services, including post handling, bill payments and access to government services. Their presence is particularly important in rural areas, providing a crucial link to essential services. In areas without a physical post office, a mobile post office ensures that residents still have access to essential postal services. This is vital for maintaining connectivity and access to important services¹¹.
- 3.56 Cash machines (ATMs) provide residents with 24/7 access to cash withdrawal services, enabling financial transactions and day-to-day purchases. This is especially important in areas where bank branches may have limited hours¹².
- 3.57 For this indicator, points are awarded based on the presence and type of financial services available within the settlement. Higher points are given for settlements with a bank/building society, physical post office and cash machines, while lower points are allocated to those relying on mobile post offices or lacking post office services altogether.

Supermarkets and convenience stores

- 3.58 The Department for Transport travel data (**Appendix A**) identifies accessing shopping destinations as the largest cause for trip generation and accounted for around 151 trips on average per person in 2022. Access to supermarkets and convenience stores are increasingly important to ensure that residents can meet their regular shopping needs. This is becoming increasingly important as our shopping habits change with more people nationally choosing to shop several times a week rather than undertaking one large shop. Where there is limited or no access to either a supermarket or a convenience store then residents may need to undertake numerous trips out of the settlement to fulfil their shopping needs, greatly increasing the number of car journeys.
- 3.59 To identify convenience stores within a settlement, the Governments [Business rates: find a property search tool](#) was used to categorise the stores into the following types:
- Hypermarkets/superstores (over 2500m²).
 - Large food stores (750 - 2500m²).
 - Small convenience store e.g., Newsagent, convenience store, express/metro shop, corner shop etc.
 - Single themed store e.g., butcher, bakery.

Non-convenience stores

- 3.60 Non-convenience stores¹³ are classified as any shop or retail outlet that is not a convenience store, supermarket or single-themed convenience store (such as a butchers). A diverse retail offer can contribute to the social well-being of local communities, act as a driver for tourism

by making centres more attractive and contributes to urban regeneration and the vitality and viability of town centres. As such, it is considered that this indicator meets paragraph 88d of the NPPF by reflecting the availability of accessible local services such as local shops.

Restaurants, cafes and takeaways

3.61 Cafés, restaurants and takeaways¹⁴ contribute toward the creation of sustainable settlements by providing both a daytime and an evening service to residents; stimulating the evening economy and expanding the local job offer. Extending the offer available to residents also reduces the need to travel for social interaction which is especially important for those with no access to private or public transport, the elderly and those with disabilities who may find travel difficult. It is considered that the indicator reflects the requirements of paragraph 8 of the NPPF which notes that sustainable developments support communities' health, social and cultural well-being.

4. Settlement study results

- 8.1 Each settlement was assessed using the approach detailed in the methodology set out at [section 3](#). A desk top analysis was used along with local knowledge and field visits to settlements to understand the level and range of services available in each settlement.
- 8.2 The full assessments which identified the services and facilities within each settlement are set out at [Appendix C](#). This details the full range of services and settlements identified within and accessible to each settlement.
- 8.3 Once the services and facilities had been identified for each settlement this was assessed using the criteria approach set out within the methodology. The overall scores per indicator for each settlement are set out in detail at [Appendix B](#). The total score available is **240** which is broken down as follows:
- Education - 30
 - Health - 40
 - Culture and community - 40
 - Leisure and Open Spaces - 30
 - Employment – 20
 - Transport - 40
 - Retail and services - 40
- 8.4 Table 9 summarises the settlement assessments using the scoring criteria set out in the methodology.

8.5 The overall scoring highlights the significant variation in the availability and accessibility of services and facilities across the district's settlements. The settlements can generally be grouped based on similar scores, which helps in identifying a settlement hierarchy according to the level of accessible services and facilities. This hierarchy is detailed in [section 8](#) of this study.

6. Settlement infrastructure capacity

6.1 For infrastructure types deemed critical in serving the district's needs, an additional assessment has been conducted to determine if there is a specific impact on growth potential at the settlement level. As the new local plan progresses, this section will be updated to reflect the ongoing discussions with local infrastructure providers and the potential impact of preferred growth options. The infrastructure types considered in this section are as follows:

- Primary education.
- Secondary education.
- Primary and secondary healthcare.
- Transport.

Education

6.2 Schools are considered a type of infrastructure that is critical to the sustainability of a settlement. The provision (or lack) of school provision within a settlement is likely to be a key factor in determining the quantum of growth that can be accommodated within it. Table 10 details the education scoring for each settlement.

School capacity in Lichfield district

- 6.3 Data has been obtained from the Government's [Schools Information Service](#) and from [Staffordshire County Council](#) in order to understand the available level of capacity within each of the district's schools, based on the most up-to-date available data (end of 2022/23 academic year).
- 6.4 There are a total of 47 schools across the district, comprised of:
- 41 state primary schools.
 - 5 state secondary schools.
 - 1 independent (private) school – which is a 'through school' (i.e., serving children from primary through to secondary ages).
- 6.5 There are primary schools located in all settlements except for Upper Longdon, Hammerwich, Harlaston and Hamstall Ridware, however these settlements fall within the catchment of other primary schools less than 2 miles away.
- 6.6 There are five secondary schools located in Lichfield and Burntwood with a wide-ranging catchment area. All remaining settlements, except for Colton, Wigginton, Hammerwich and Hamstall Ridware have public transport access to their catchment secondary school.
- 6.7 Table 11 sets out the current level of primary and secondary education provision in the district, including capacity and number of pupils currently on roll (as of 2022/23). The table also sets out where a school has had to refuse a school place application over the previous 5 years, which helps to build up a geographical picture of capacity issues across the district.

- 6.8 Table 12 illustrates that a number of primary schools within the district’s rural settlements currently have some capacity to accommodate additional pupils. This includes All Saints CofE Primary School in Alrewas which operates at 61% of its capacity; as well as primary schools in Drayton Bassett, Elford, Colton and Edingale, which all operate under 80% capacity.
- 6.9 There are also newly opened primary schools in Lichfield and Fradley which have not yet reached their full capacity, this is because new schools are usually filled from their first year upwards meaning it takes several years for the school to have pupils in all year groups. In addition, Netherstowe Secondary School in Lichfield is currently operating at 72% capacity.
- 6.10 There are a number of schools which are currently operating at capacity or over capacity. The most overcrowded schools in the district are:
- King Edward VI Secondary School, Lichfield (115%).
 - Charnwood Primary Academy, Lichfield (110%).
 - Five Spires Academy, Lichfield (110%).
 - St Leonards CofE (A) Primary School, Wigginton (109%).
 - Little Aston Primary Academy, Little Aston (107%).
 - St Chads CofE Primary School, Lichfield (105%).
- 6.11 Furthermore, the following schools are at or near capacity:
- St Michaels CofE Primary School, Lichfield (101%).
 - St Joseph’s RC Primary School, Lichfield (101%).
 - Thomas Barnes Primary School, Hopwas (101%).
 - Christ Church CofE Primary School, Lichfield (100%).
 - St Joseph & St Theresa Catholic Primary School (100%).
- 6.12 It is notable that the majority of overcrowded or at capacity primary schools are within Lichfield city. However, Lichfield’s secondary schools are, with the exception of King Edward VI School, operating at or under capacity, particularly Netherstowe School which is operating at 72% capacity.
- 6.13 It is important to consider that capacity figures reflect a single point in time and published figures may not be fully representative of actual capacity. Appropriate caution should therefore be applied when utilising capacity figures. This study only provides an initial assessment of provision and capacity for the purposes of establishing a baseline.
- 6.14 The [schools’ admissions data](#) published by Staffordshire County Council provides an indicator of capacity trends across time. Table 11 shows where schools have been oversubscribed over the last 5 years, resulting in applications being refused. The following schools have been consistently oversubscribed over the last 5 years:
- Streethay Primary Academy, Streethay.
 - King Edward VI Secondary School, Lichfield.
 - The Friary School, Lichfield.

- Erasmus Darwin Secondary School, Burntwood¹⁶.
- Thomas Barnes Primary School, Hopwas.

6.15 In addition, the following schools have been oversubscribed at least 3 years out of the last 5 years:

- St Joseph's RC Primary School, Lichfield.
- Five Spires Primary School, Lichfield.
- Fulfen Primary School, Burntwood.
- St Leonards Primary School, Wigginton.

Future primary and secondary education provision

6.16 Looking forward, Staffordshire County Council have indicated several planned school improvements. These include:

- **St. Johns Grange, Lichfield – new primary school**
 - A 2-form entry (FE) (420 place) primary school is being delivered for September 2025 but will operate as a 1FE (210 place) primary school until the requirement for further places is identified after the five-year period.
- **Fradley park primary and nursery school**
 - This new school has the capability to be expanded to 2FE (420 places). The expansion will be delivered in line with the growth in pupil numbers in Fradley from further committed housing development. Delivery could be from September 2026.
- **Rugeley power station site – new all-through school**
 - The school will initially operate with 1FE (30 places per year group- 210 places in total) of primary provision which will be increased to 2FE (60 places per year group- 420 places in total), in the future, in line with demand for additional places from the new housing on the former Power Station site. At secondary level it will offer 5FE (150 places per year – 750 places in total) of provision.
- **Watery Lane, Lichfield – new primary school**
 - 1 FE primary school. Opening date to be confirmed.
- **Arkall Farm, Tamworth – new primary School**
 - 1FE primary school. Opening date to be confirmed.

6.17 Whilst these schemes will help to address some of the capacity issues identified in Table 11, it should be noted that the above new schools are being delivered to accommodate demand arising from new development and it is unlikely that they will have capacity to accommodate pupils from outside their catchment area.

¹⁶ It is important to note that Erasmus Darwin Academy does not have a catchment area and will naturally attract a larger number of applications across a wider area.

Education summary

- There are primary and secondary education capacity constraints in Lichfield, particularly at Streethay Primary Academy, Five Spires Academy, King Edward VI School and Friary School, indicating capacity issues to the south and east of the city, likely a result of recent housing growth in these areas.
- There are secondary education capacity constraints at Erasmus Darwin Academy in Burntwood, however this school does not currently have a catchment area and will therefore naturally attract a higher number of applications for school places. Additionally, Fulfen Primary School, located to the east of Burntwood has been oversubscribed for the past four years.
- There are also primary education constraints in Hopwas and Wigginton, which results in families having to travel to nearby Tamworth to access primary education provision.
- Upper Longdon, Hammerwich, Harlaston and Hamstall Ridware do not have a primary school within their settlement boundary. However, these settlements fall within the catchment of other primary schools less than 2 miles away.
- Colton, Wigginton, Hammerwich and Hamstall Ridware currently have no public transport access to nearby secondary schools.
- There are a number of new primary schools planned in Lichfield, Fradley, Arkall Farm and a new all through school at the former Rugeley Power Station.

Health

6.18 This section considers the capacity of healthcare and emergency service provision within Lichfield district. Settlements have been scored based on their access to the following types of health infrastructure:

- Primary healthcare (GP surgeries, pharmacists, dentists, opticians).
- Secondary healthcare (Hospitals).

6.19 Table 12 outlines the overall health scores, derived from the settlement hierarchy study methodology described in Section 3. The results indicate that Lichfield and Burntwood benefit from a larger range of healthcare services within their settlements, whereas the smaller villages, particularly those in the eastern part of the district, have limited access to healthcare provision.

Primary Healthcare

- 6.20 There are currently 9 GP surgeries within the district. These are located in the district's key urban areas of Lichfield and Burntwood and in most of the larger villages with the exception of Fradley and Little Aston.
- 6.21 There are no GP surgeries in any of the district's other rural settlements, where residents are reliant on travelling to other settlements for primary healthcare provision. Table 13 below provides a list of all GP surgeries with catchment areas that serve Lichfield district.

- 6.22 There is complete GP coverage for all of the district's settlements, with a significant degree of catchment area overlap, particularly in Fazeley, Mile Oak & Bonehill, Burntwood and the villages neighbouring Rugeley. This allows patients a significant degree of choice over which surgery to register with. Inevitably, this results in surgeries which are under greater pressure than others. However, because surgeries are only able to stop registering new patients in exceptional circumstances, there is no objective means by which to comment on how constrained individual surgeries are.
- 6.23 One measure of surgeries ability to cope is its Care Quality Commission (CQC) Rating, set out in Table 13 above. These are based upon five metrics to establish the performance of surgeries and the extent to which they are meeting patient expectations – the safety of their care and the effectiveness of their care, the extent to which staff show care, the responsiveness of services and the quality of leadership and management.
- 6.24 The majority of the district's GP surgeries have been rated "good" by the CQC on their most recent inspection, with only Sandy Lane Surgery in Rugeley (outside of the district but with a catchment area that incorporates Upper Longdon) requiring improvement. No surgeries within the district are rated as inadequate.
- 6.25 In addition to this, the annual [GP Patient Survey](#) is a useful tool to assess patients' experience of healthcare services provided by GP practices. Table 13 above sets out the percentage of patients who reported that their overall experience of their GP practice was 'good'. It is worth noting that the overall national average for this metric was 71%. GP Practices that scored below this figure have been highlighted in red in Table 13. Notably, all of the GP surgeries located within Lichfield district the national average with the exception of Langton Medical Practice (60%) and Westgate Practice (70%). Both these practices have their main surgery based in Lichfield. This would suggest that there are potentially some capacity issues in relation to GP and primary healthcare provision in Lichfield city.

Secondary healthcare

- 6.26 There are 3 hospitals in Lichfield district, although none of these hospitals have an accident and emergency (A&E) department. These are:
- Samuel Johnson Hospital, Lichfield – community hospital.
 - Sir Robert Peel Hospital, Mile Oak – community hospital.
 - Spire Little Aston Hospital – private hospital.
- 6.27 For accident and emergency healthcare needs, residents need to travel to hospitals outside the district. The main hospitals serving the district are:
- Good Hope Hospital, Sutton Coldfield.
 - Burton Queens Hospital, Burton Upon Trent.
 - Manor Hospital, Walsall.
 - Stafford Hospital, Stafford.

- 6.28 Similar to primary healthcare, secondary healthcare providers can only stop accepting new patients under exceptional circumstances. As a result, there is no objective means to assess how constrained local secondary healthcare provision is. Ratings by the Care Quality Commission (CQC) serve as a proxy to gauge how well each Trust is coping with demand.
- 6.29 Samuel Johnson, Sir Robert Peel and Little Aston Spire Hospitals have all been rated as good by the CQC. However, Good Hope Hospital in Sutton Coldfield has been rated as inadequate for its medical care and emergency services and requires improvement for its maternity and surgery services. Burton Queens Hospital, Stafford Hospital and Manor Hospital in Walsall have all been rated as requiring improvement. This indicates that the local hospitals offering acute and emergency care are struggling to meet demand.

Healthcare summary

- There are GP practices located within the main centres of Lichfield and Burntwood and most of the larger villages with the exception of Little Aston and Fradley. However, Fradley residents have the choice of registering with Westgate Practice in Lichfield, Riverside Surgery in Tamworth, Alrewas Surgery, Langton Medical Group in Lichfield and Yoxall Surgery. Similarly, Little Aston residents can register with nearby Blackwood Health Centre, Kirpal Medical Practice and The Oaks Medical Centre.
- Villages in the east of the district scored poorly in the settlement study for healthcare access. This includes Elford, Edingale, Clifton Campville and Harlaston.
- All GP surgeries in Lichfield district scored 'Good' in their latest CQC inspection.
- Most of the GP surgeries located within Lichfield district scored above the national average of 71% in the latest GP Patient Survey, except for Langton Medical Practice (60%) and Westgate Practice (70%), indicating potential GP capacity issues in Lichfield city.
- A new Health Centre is to be delivered at Cherry Close in Burntwood in 2025, providing additional clinical capacity for Burntwood.
- There are no hospitals with A&E departments within the district. Local hospitals in neighbouring authorities with A&E departments are rated as requiring improvement or inadequate, indicating a potential secondary healthcare capacity issue within the region.

Transport

- 6.30 This section considers the capacity of transport provision within Lichfield district. Settlements have been scored based on their access to the following types of transport:
- Weekday and weekend bus services.
 - Access to a railway station.
 - Access to the principal road network.
- 6.31 Table 14 sets out the transport scores for each settlement, derived from the methodology in Section 3.

6.32 Table 14 demonstrates that there is a wide variation in the scores, with Lichfield scoring highest and the smaller rural villages receiving lower scores. Burntwood received a modest score of 12 (out of 40) for transport, highlighting the relatively poor transport connectivity of the town relative to its population size and its ranking within the settlement hierarchy.

6.33 Settlements with a score of zero for transport links are Upper Longdon, Longdon and Hamstall Ridware, indicating poor accessibility in the northern rural part of the district.

Bus services

6.34 Transport linkages in rural areas are a vital component when considering the sustainability of a settlement. Good public transport links with higher tier centres allow residents to access services which may not be present within their own settlement.

6.35 Table 15 provides the scores for bus provision (not including term time school services) in each settlement, for both weekday and weekend services.

- 6.36 There are eight settlements which do not have access to a bus service and have therefore scored zero. These are; Drayton Bassett, Colton, Longdon, Wigginton, Upper Longdon, Harlaston, Hammerwich and Hamstall Ridware.
- 6.37 In addition, Elford, Hammerwich, Clifton Campville and Edingale do not have access to bus services on the weekend. This reflects both the remoteness of these settlements and their low population size, factors which undoubtedly affect the viability of providing regular bus services to these destinations.
- 6.38 All settlements, with the exception of Colton, Wigginton, Hammerwich and Hamstall Ridware, are served by term time school transport services¹⁷, enabling children living in the settlement to travel by bus to their catchment secondary school.

Rail services

- 6.39 Railway provision is a critical component of settlement sustainability, impacting both the accessibility and economic viability of a settlement. This section will consider the current railway provision in the district and identify the gaps in provision.
- 6.40 There are four railway stations within Lichfield district, these are:
- Lichfield Trent Valley: This station is served by two lines. The first is the Cross City Line, providing services to Sutton Coldfield, Birmingham, Redditch and Bromsgrove. It is also located on the West Coast Mainline, offering direct services to London Euston, Crewe, Liverpool, Tamworth, Stafford and Holyhead, amongst others.

- Rugeley Trent Valley: Served by the West Coast Mainline and Chase Line which provides services to Walsall, Cannock and Birmingham.
- Lichfield City: Served by the Cross City Line.
- Shenstone: Served by the Cross City Line.

6.41 The following settlements benefit from the presence of a railway station:

Highways

- 6.44 The district is served by the A5, A38, A5148 and M6 Toll; all of which are part of the Strategic Road Network (SRN). The SRN comprises motorways and major A roads which are at the core of the national transport system, providing strategic connections across the country.
- 6.45 The four SRN routes all connect at Wall Island, to the south of Lichfield; and can also be accessed via various junctions throughout the district.
- 6.46 The SRN routes are summarised below:
- A5 – Provides an east-west connection from London to Holyhead; with connectivity through urban areas in the Midlands including Hinckley, Atherstone, Tamworth, Lichfield, Burntwood, Brownhills, Cannock, Telford and Shrewsbury. Also provides links to the wider SRN including M42, A38, M5, M54, M1 and M6.
 - A38 – Provides a north-south connection from Mansfield to Bodmin, including links through Derby, Burton upon Trent, Fradley, Lichfield, Sutton Coldfield, Birmingham and Worcester. Also provides links to the wider SRN including M1, A50, M5 and M6.
 - A1548 – Provides a north-south connection between the A38 and Wall Island.
 - M6 Toll – Connects the M6 junction 3a at the Coleshill Interchange with M6 Junction 11A at Wolverhampton.
- 6.47 These SRN routes are important nationally, making the district attractive to employers and supporting economic growth in the key employment areas in Lichfield city, Burntwood and Fradley. These routes also provide important local links as they connect the district to neighbouring centres such as Burton upon Trent, Derby, Sutton Coldfield, Tamworth and Birmingham, as well as national destinations further afield and connections to the wider SRN.
- 6.48 In addition, the A5192 and A51 run through the district and are part of the Major Road Network (MRN), which forms a middle tier of the country's busiest and most economically local authority A roads. The A5192 runs along the northern edge of Lichfield and connects the A51 with the A38. The A51 links Lichfield to the north, including connections with Rugeley and Stone, as well as connecting to the A34 which links to Stoke on Trent, the M6 and A50.

Transport Summary

- Overall Lichfield City scored maximum points for transport accessibility as it benefits from regional and national rail services as well as a good level of regional bus connectivity.

- Burntwood, however received a modest score of 12 (out of 40) for transport, highlighting the relatively poor transport connectivity of the town relative to its population size and its ranking within the settlement hierarchy.
- Three settlements scored zero for transport links. These are Upper Longdon, Longdon and Hamstall Ridware, indicating poor accessibility in the northern rural part of the district.
- There are eight settlements which are not served by bus. These are Drayton Bassett, Colton, Longdon, Wigginton, Upper Longdon, Harlaston, Hammerwich and Hamstall Ridware. In addition, Elford, Clifton Campville and Edingale do not have access to bus services on the weekend.
- Lichfield district benefits from four railway stations, two in Lichfield City, one in Shenstone and one in Rugeley. These provide links to regional and national services, including fast commuter services to London, Birmingham and the north.
- All settlements, with the exception of Colton, Wigginton, Hammerwich and Hamstall Ridware, are served by term time school transport services, enabling children living in the settlement to travel by bus to their catchment secondary school.
- The following settlements are within 3 miles of a railway station: Fazeley, Mile Oak & Bonehill, Little Aston, Whittington, Hopwas, Stonnall, Drayton Bassett, Colton and Wigginton.
- The following settlements are more than 3 miles from a railway station: Burntwood, Armitage with Handsacre, Fradley, Alrewas, Kings Bromley, Hill Ridware, Longdon, Elford, Clifton Campville, Upper Longdon, Edingale, Harlaston and Hamstall Ridware.
- The district is served by the A5, A38, A5148 and M6 Toll; all of which are part of the Strategic Road Network. In addition, the A5192 and A51 run through the district and are part of the Major Road Network.

7. Settlement infrastructure capacity – initial findings

- 7.1 The previous section of this report has set out the baseline levels of provision and implications for future growth the following critical infrastructure types:
- Primary and secondary education.
 - Healthcare – GP and hospital provision.
 - Public transport and highways.
- 7.2 Of these infrastructure types, there are several identified capacity constraints, these being:
- A lack of capacity in a number of the district’s primary and secondary schools, which is likely to limit the amount of housing able to come forward in some settlements without the provision of new or enlarged schools. This is particularly evident in Lichfield city, Burntwood, Hopwas and Wigginton.
 - Whilst there is little information available at this stage on fixed capacities for the district’s primary health surgeries, many are constrained and likely to need expansion to accommodate growth. This is particularly evident in Lichfield City and Burntwood. In addition, there is currently no primary healthcare provision in Little Aston and Fradley.
 - Several rural settlements do not have access to a bus service, these being Drayton Bassett, Colton, Longdon, Wigginton, Upper Longdon, Harlaston, Hammerwich and Hamstall Ridware. Furthermore, Elford, Clifton Campville and Edingale do not have access to weekend bus services.
 - The district benefits from rail links to the West Coast Mainline, Cross City Line, Chase Line and Cross-Country lines. Lichfield in particular benefits from having two railway stations and direct services to London, Birmingham and the North-West. However, more than half of the district’s settlements are located more than 3 miles from a railway station, including Burntwood which scores relatively low on transport links relative to its population size.
 - The district is served by the A5, A38, A5148 and M6 Toll; all of which are part of the SRN. These four links connect at Wall Island, but also have other junctions which can be accessed throughout the district. These SRN links provide connections to neighbouring urban centres such as Burton upon Trent, Derby, Sutton Coldfield, Tamworth and Birmingham, as well as national destinations further afield.
- 7.3 For all infrastructure types, it will be important to ensure that the emerging Local Plan includes suitable policies to ensure that the Council has means available to ensure the provision of that infrastructure – and that necessary contributions to help to provide and fund it can be secured as far as possible.

8. Settlement hierarchy

- 8.1 Based upon the above settlement scoring and infrastructure capacity analysis, Table 18 sets out a settlement hierarchy based upon the accessible level of services and facilities for settlements. This identifies the most sustainable locations if it were based solely on their provision of existing facilities and accessibility to services. Table 10 also provides a summary of key infrastructure capacity issues for each settlement, as identified in sections 6 and 7 above.
- 8.2 This study does not seek to suggest the levels of growth which each level of the settlement hierarchy should accommodate. As this study acknowledges, services provision is not fixed and can evolve over time according to market forces or changing work and travel patterns.

- 8.3 The findings of the settlement study in Table 18 are mostly consistent with the findings of the previous settlement sustainability study. However, due to the methodology now accounting for both the presence and quantity of specific infrastructure types, there have been some changes in the scoring of the settlements. Furthermore, this study has identified existing capacity issues across key infrastructure types for each settlement, offering a deeper understanding of their sustainability and potential to accommodate further growth.
- 8.4 In terms of the settlement hierarchy itself, there have been two changes to the rankings. Drayton Bassett, previously categorised as a Level 5 settlement, has been upgraded to a Level 4 settlement due to its higher score in the 2024 study. This recognition is based on the availability of services and facilities in the settlement, as well as its proximity to services in Fazeley and Tamworth. Additionally, following the formal designation of Hammerwich's village boundary in the Hammerwich Neighbourhood Plan, Hammerwich has now been assessed and identified as a Level 5 settlement.

9. Settlement sustainability summary

- 5.1 Lichfield and Burntwood continue to be at the top of the settlement hierarchy due to their greater access to services and facilities, classifying them as Level 1 and Level 2 settlements, respectively. This classification is consistent with the findings of previous assessments. However, as highlighted in Table 10, there are notable capacity issues in some primary and secondary schools in both Lichfield city and Burntwood. Similarly, the evidence indicates that primary and secondary healthcare capacity is also under significant pressure in these areas.
- 5.2 Level 3 settlements have remained largely consistent with those identified in previous study. Little Aston, which had previously been identified within the 'other rural' category in the Local Plan Strategy has now moved up into Level 3 owing to its good level of facilities, services, transport connections and proximity to the facilities located closely within the wider conurbation.
- 5.3 A fourth level of settlements has been identified with these settlements scoring higher than several other smaller rural settlements lacking access to services, facilities and public transport. Stonnall, Kings Bromley, Drayton Bassett and Hopwas have been designated as Level 4, with all other settlements and the wider rural areas classified as Level 5.
- 5.4 The relative sustainability of settlements remains consistent with previous studies with Lichfield as the strategic centre, Burntwood as a large centre and seven larger rural settlements (Alrewas, Armitage with Handsacre, Fazeley, Little Aston, Mile Oak and Bonehill, Fradley, Shenstone and Whittington) and the remaining settlements falling under 'Other Rural Settlements'. This study indicates the potential to further divide the other rural areas into two levels, with Stonnall, Kings Bromley, Hopwas and Drayton Bassett scoring slightly higher than other rural settlements.

Appendix A: Department for Transport travel data

To establish which facilities and services are most valued and used by communities it was important to understand which facilities generate the largest number of trips. Where communities have better access locally to these facilities or where they are accessible by sustainable transport this will lead to more sustainable patterns of transport and enable people to access the services and facilities they value and use more easily.
